QUOTATIONS

"The conclusion to the first oracle (14:24–27) indicates that the reason for the fall of Babylon and Assyria was not just to remove the pride of these powerful nations (13:19; 14:11–14), but they also demonstrate that (a) God was the sovereign power that rules over that nation; (b) God has a plan for every nation on earth; (c) God will crush those who oppose him; (d) God will bring salvation to his oppressed people; and (e) many people from these foreign nations will eventually come and worship the God of Judah." (Smith 2007: 291).

"A third argument against trusting Babylon is that God's people do not need the protection of Babylon to survive an Assyrian attack, for God himself will destroy Assyria (14:24–27). If the people of Judah would believe that this is the certain conclusion to God's plan and that no one can change the plans that God has determined (14:27), the nation of Judah should be willing to trust God Almighty with its present problems. It has always been true that what people believe about God will determine their practical walk, just as their practical walk will reveal what they really believe about God. The extent of each person's trust in God is evident in the decisions they make and the things they do" (Smith 2007: 295).

"Isaiah was sharing the good and the bad news about the future events that God had planned for the world so that his audience could choose to follow God and experience God's grace" (Smith 2007: 321).

"No one can avoid the issue of trust; people either believe what God has said he will do, or in pride they make their own "better" plans. When arrogant people (especially those who profess to be believers) reject God's plans and try to raise themselves up as the ruler of their lives, they are actually attempting to take God's place and exalt themselves higher than God. Their fate is clear; the wrath of God, humiliation, and the maggots of the grave await them" (Smith 2007: 323).

"Most of the time people know what God would want them to do. The really difficult question is: Are they willing to follow God's direction? There is no indication in the prophet's thinking that there is a way to straddle the fence and partially trust God in order to hedge your bets; it is either man's way or God's way" (Smith 2007: 326).
